REVOCATION ORDER

On or about January 7, 2026, Sanjay Mehta, D.O. was adjudicated guilty of three (3) felony counts of Aiding and Abetting the Acquisition and Possession of a Controlled Substance by Misrepresentation, Fraud, Forgery, Deception, and Subterfuge in the United States District Court for the Southern District of West Virginia. See Exhibit 1. Whereupon, Dr. Sanjay Mehta's license to practice osteopathic medicine and surgery in the State of West Virginia is hereby **REVOKED**.

1. Sanjay Mehta, D.O. ("Dr. Mehta") is a licensee of the West Virginia Board of Osteopathic Medicine ("Board"), possessing Board-issued license number 1754 to practice osteopathic medicine and surgery in the state of West Virginia.
2. On May 28, 2025, an Information was filed in the United States District Court for the Southern District of West Virginia, Case Number 5:25-CR-00104, captioned United States of America v. Sanjay Mehta, D.O., which charged Dr. Mehta with three (3) felony counts of Aiding and Abetting the Acquisition and Possession of a Controlled Substance

by Misrepresentation, Fraud, Forgery, Deception, and Subterfuge, in violation of 21 U.S.C. § 843(a)(3) and 18 U.S.C. § 2. See Exhibit 2.

3. On or about January 29, 2015, the Board received a complaint alleging that Dr. Mehta engaged in unprofessional conduct while he worked at Hope Clinic, PLLC, in Beaver, West Virginia, as more fully described therein. The Board designated the matter as Complaint No. 2015-11.
4. On or about June 8, 2016, the Board determined there was probable cause to believe the allegations against Dr. Mehta in the above-styled complaint and issued a Statement of Charges against him. The Board proceeded to suspend Dr. Mehta's license prior to a hearing, pursuant to W. Va. Code § 30-1-8(e)(1), after concluding that his continued practice of medicine constituted an immediate danger to the public.
5. On or about February 15, 2018, a multi-count indictment was filed against Dr. Mehta and others in the United States District Court for the Southern District of West Virginia. Subsequently, a grand jury in the United States District Court for the Southern District of West Virginia returned a superseding indictment, a second superseding indictment, a third superseding indictment and a fourth superseding indictment against Dr. Mehta and others was filed on or about August 17, 2022. The charges contained in the respective indictments related to the allegations contained in the above-styled Board complaint. The administrative hearing on the Statement of Charges was continued pending the outcome of the criminal matter.
6. On or about January 7, 2026, Dr. Mehta pled guilty to the three felony offenses contained in the Information and was adjudicated guilty of the same, which resolved his criminal charges.

7. West Virginia Code § 30-14-11(a)(1) imposes a nondiscretionary duty upon the Board to revoke a license if a licensee has been convicted of a felony offense that involves the transfer, delivery, or illicit possession of a prescription drug.
8. Thereafter, the Board concluded that it had received sufficient proof, pursuant to West Virginia Code § 30-14-11(a)(1), to determine that Dr. Sanjay Mehta, D.O., has been convicted in a court of competent jurisdiction of (3) felonies involving the transfer, delivery, or illicit possession of a prescription drug.

Wherefore, the Board **ORDERS** that Dr. Sanjay Mehta's license to practice osteopathic medicine and surgery in the state of West Virginia, license number 1754, is hereby **REVOKED**. This action resolves Complaint No. 2015-11, which contained allegations that were indistinguishable from his criminal charges.
