New Legislative Rules Passed During 2011 Legislative Session

H.B. 2639:

Authorized the WV Board of Osteopathy to promulgate the following legislative rules:

24 CSR 2

The rule repeals and replaces the existing rule of the WV Board of Osteopathy regarding the licensing and practice of osteopathic physician assistants. The revisions were reviewed and accepted in concert with the WV Association of Physician Assistants. Some of the major changes include:

- 1) Elimination of the limitation on the number of physicians who may supervise a PA;
- 2) Updated the CME requirements to be consistent with NCCPA 100 hours/2 years;
- Modified the requirement for clinical pharmacology credit hours for prescriptive writing privileges;
- Eliminated the requirement for prescription pads to include the list of drugs the PA is authorized to prescribe. A copy of each approved PA formulary will be forwarded to the Board of Pharmacy.

24 CSR 5

Previously, fees to apply for a license to practice as an osteopathic physician assistant had been set by the West Virginia Code. In 2010, the Legislature authorized the WV Board of Osteopathy to set fees for osteopathic PA's by Rule. The new section 3 [§24-5-3] of the Rule, establishes the fees on the same schedule as the WV Board of Medicine. This represents an increase to \$200 for an initial license, \$100 for a license renewal and \$50 to file a change of employment/duties with the Board.

Section 4 [§24-5-4] contains a new provision for the cost of providing CD and DVD copies of records under the Freedom of Information Act.

CHRIS WRONIAK TO RETIRE FROM BOARD STAFF



OPIOID PRESCRIBING REQUIRES CLOSE PATIENT MONITORING

A recent article by Kevin B. O'Reilly, from the AMEDNEWS Staff quoted a study that found primary care physicians avoided urine screening and other methods to prevent abuse of the pain medications even with highest risk patients.

Dr. Lynn Webster, a board member of the American Academy of Pain Medicine, was quoted, "It is quite remarkable that in the face of an epidemic of drug abuse, diversion and an alarming rate of overdose deaths that prescribers are lackadaisical in their prescribing of opioids."

To reduce the risk of overdose, pain specialists advise that doctors monitor closely those patients receiving opioids to ensure that they do not misuse the drugs. But a study shows that some primary care doctors are not aggressive in using monitoring strategies that could help prevent misuse and diversion. These include checking state pharmacy registries, seeing patients regularly and documenting if other therapies are being considered, urine drug screens, patient contracts and restricting early refills on medications.
