## HOW SENATE BILL 437 WILL AFFECT YOUR PRESCRIBING OF CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES

During the 2012 Legislative Session, Senate Bill 437 was passed which provided specific requirements for West Virginia Licensing Boards to enforce regarding the treatment of chronic, non-malignant pain.

One requirement that will affect every physician and physician assistant licensed by the WV Board of Osteopathic Medicine is the CME requirement. Effective July 1, 2012, two hours of "End of Life Care/Pain Management" is no longer required. What takes its place is a **three-hour CME requirement**, every two years with a "Board-Approved" CME which must include drug diversion training and best practice prescribing of controlled substances. Two board-approved events will be held in 2012:

 a) September 28, 2012: Held at WVSOM for 7.5 hours Category I;

b) November 30, 2012: Held at Embassy Suites, Charleston for 7.5 hrs Cat. I.

# IF MORE THAN 50% OF PRACTICE PATIENTS ARE ON CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES FOR CHRONIC NON-MALIGNANT PAIN YOU WILL BE REQUIRED TO:

Become licensed as a Pain Management Clinic. This annual licensing process will be conducted by West Virginia DHHR, with inspections and oversight under the authority of the Office of Health Facility Licensure and Certification.

(Rules are currently be developed by the DHHR and, when completed, will be submitted for public comment. Additional information will be forth coming.)

## IF LESS THAN 50% OF YOUR PATIENTS ARE ON CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES FOR CHRONIC NON-MALIGNANT PAIN YOU ARE RESPONSIBLE FOR:

Following the seven (7) national guidelines, developed by the Federation of State Medical Boards, that support rational and transparent opioid prescribing. Each is described as follows:

 Patient Evaluation: Perform a complete H&P by taking time with the patient; focusing on the patient, not the pain and using reflective listening skills.

2) Creating a Treatment Plan: The plan should state objectives that will be used to determine treatment success, such as pain relief and improved physical and psychosocial function. Drug therapy should not always be the first line of treatment. Other treatment modalities or rehabilitation may be necessary depending on the of the pain.

 Informed Consent/Agreement for Treatment: Enter into a mutually agreed upon treatment agreement with patient. Samples of such documents can be found at www.painmed.org.

4) Periodic Review: Upon initial treatment, a follow up may be needed every two weeks for a while. Monitor functional status, drug side effects, conduct urine/blood drug screens, pill counts, listen to family members' comments on the patient's behaviors. Review Pharmacy Database monitoring reports and file in patient's chart.

 Referral & Pain Management: If patient does not improve don't just up the dosage of prescriptions. Refer to Pain Management, Neurology or other pain specialist.

 Documentation: Make sure every discussion, test result, phone call, etc. is documented.

7) Compliance with State Laws: Even though the use of controlled substances has proven successful in the treatment of chronic pain, it also has the potential for abuse. The medical community has been unsuccessful in halting this epidemic and now the regulatory environment is stepping up their vigilance on this issue. Senate Bill 437 has taken several legislative steps by creating licensing for chronic pain management clinics, requiring physician access to state pharmacy monitoring database and requiring ongoing practitioner CME on pain management prescribing.

We welcome Chelsea to our Charleston Office.





#### BOARD OFFICE PURCHASES NEW COMPUTER SYSTEM
